Julie Hancock is a write-in against Gallagher

Attorney Julie Hancock needs 7,000 write-in votes on the Aug. 9 primary ballot — early voting or on Election Day — to earn vie for the 8th Congressional District seat in November. She opposes incumbent Rep. Mike Gallagher, R-Allouez. "If you feel ignored, left out, lied to, and treated like you're stupid by your political leaders, my campaign is for you," she wrote for the Democratic Party of Door County.

To meet her financial obligations mandated by the Federal Election Commission, she asks for donations of \$5 (and up) "to support electing a pro-choice, pro-family, pro-marriage Democratic

Tom Nelson ends his Senate race

After more than two years of campaigning, on July 25 Tom Nelson ended his race for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate to oppose incumbent Ron Johnson, R-Wis. "We just didn't have the money to get the message out," he told the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel.

Among the ideas his campaign promoted are "a national industrial strategy to build good paying jobs in our communities, Medicare for All to ensure everyone has access to health care, a one-of-a-kind food sovereignty plan to lift up our family farmers, bust up Big Ag and help consumers, and a Green New Deal so our children and their children have a planet to live on," he said in a statement.

Running fourth in the polls, the Outagamie County Executive announced his support for Mandela Barnes, currently Wisconsin's lieutenant governor. Because the Aug. 9 ballots are already printed, Nelson's name appears on them. *nelsonforwi.com; jsonline.com*

Meeting highlights, July 2, 2022

- Volunteers are needed to staff the Paca Dems booth at the county fair, Aug. 24-28, at the fairgrounds in Weyauwega.
- The campaign of Henry Fries, running as an Independent for the 40th State Assembly seat, can be supported by the Waupaca County Democratic Party because he is a member of the party. Fries (say "freeze") stopped in to chat with members and guests.
- A discussion proposed taxing guns and ammunition to pay for proposed safety and security upgrades at schools, instead of taxpayers. A referendum on the Nov. 8 ballot asks taxpayers in the Waupaca School District to approve "general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3,875,000" to pay for the upgrades. The district includes parts of the counties of Waupaca, Portage and Waushara. Municipal clerks will have more information. *From minutes by member Terry Bobbe*

The deadline to request most absentee ballots is 5 p.m. Aug. 4 for the Aug. 9 partisan primary. They must be returned — mail might be too slow — to your municipal clerk's office not later than 8 p.m. Aug. 9.

The Democratic slate for Aug. 9

Here are the Democratic candidates on Waupaca County ballots and the length of terms for the offices. The Waupaca County Democratic Party will make no endorsement for any office before the primary.

U.S. Senate, 6 years: Eight Democrats are on the partisan primary ballot, vying to oppose incumbent Ron Johnson (R). In alphabetical order, they are Mandela Barnes, Milwaukee; Sarah Godlewski, Madison; Alex Lasry, Milwaukee; Kou C. Lee, Hobart; Tom Nelson, Appleton — who dropped out on July 25; Steve Olikara, Milwaukee; Peter Peckarsky, Milwaukee; and Darrell Williams, Milwaukee.

Congressional District 8, 2 years: Democrat Julie Hancock, De Pere, is working to be a write-

in against incumbent Mike Gallagher, R-Allouez.

Five Wisconsin Constitutional officers, 4 years:

Governor: Incumbent Tony Evers (D) is running unopposed.

Lieutenant Governor: Peng Her, Madison; and Sara Rodriguez, Brookfield.

Secretary of State: Incumbent Doug La Follette, Madison; and Alexia Sabor, Madison. **State Treasurer:** Gillian M. Battino, Wausau; Aaron Richardson, Fitchburg; and Angelito Tenorio, West Allis. Incumbent Sarah Godlewski (D) is vacating the office to run for U.S. Senate.

Attorney General: Incumbent Josh Kaul, Madison.

State Senator District 2 (municipalities of Bear Creek, Clintonville, Embarrass, Lebanon, Matteson, effective until Dec. 31, 2022): No contest in 2022.

State Senator District 14 (remainder of Waupaca County, effective until Dec. 31, 2022): No contest in 2022.

Wisconsin Assembly, 2 years:

State Assembly District 6 (municipalities of Bear Creek, Clintonville, Embarrass, Lebanon, Matteson, effective until Dec. 31, 2022): William J. Switalla, Wittenberg.

State Assembly District 40 (remainder of Waupaca County, effective until Dec. 31, 2022): No Democrat opposes incumbent Kevin Petersen, R-Waupaca. Henry Fries, Independent, will be on the November ballot opposing Petersen.

— Purple Heart Day, Aug. 7. The originator of the award was Gen. George Washington, who in 1782 established the Badge of Military Merit, a heart-shaped patch with purple embroidery. In 2022, the award is given to any service member who sheds blood in defense of the nation, or who sustains "mild traumatic brain injuries and concussive injuries" in combat. *armyhistory.org*

Poem of the Month

After the 1961 inauguration of Democrat John. F. Kennedy (in office 1961-1963)was the first to feature a poet, the next president to include that cultural art was Jimmy Carter (1977-1981). (The gap years between Kennedy and Carter included no poets for Democrat Lyndon Johnson 1963-1969), Republican Richard Nixon (1969-1974), or Republican Gerald Ford (1974-1977).

For Carter, poet James Dickey (1923-1997) read his poem "The Strength of Fields" at an evening Kennedy Center gala. From 1966 to 1968, Dickey held the position of Poetry Consultant to the Library of Congress, an office that would later become the Poet Laureate. Here, a few lines from "The Strength of Fields" — using his unconventional line arrangements.

Wild hope can always spring From tended strength. Everything is in that. That and nothing but kindness.
